

Academic Success

Programs and activities are designed to ensure all Club members graduate from high school, ready for a postsecondary education, and a 21st-century career. From homework help to literacy tutoring, SAT prep and college tours, the Club helps support educational needs.

Mental Health Services

Empowering kids with skills to manage their emotions and build resiliency. A full-time, on-site licensed professional counselor provided mental health support & counseling to 89 young people.

Health & Wellness

Developing young people's capacity to engage in positive behaviors to nurture their well-being. In 2021, we harvested more than 700 pounds of produce from our gardens.


The Arts

The Club has continued to do whatever it takes to serve the young people who need us most during the COVID-19 pandemic. For the 2020-2021 school year, the Club shifted program hours away from after school time to provide virtual learning pods from 8 AM to 4 PM. Kids had a safe place to log into school and were supported by caring mentors. They also received breakfast, lunch, and a snack in addition to participating in traditional Club activities when the school day was done. The Club also distributed "Club at Home" packs to families that contained household items, cleaning supplies, games, and books.

For fall 2021, the Club resumed after school programming at our Averill Unit and Peak Site. Academic success and workforce development are primary focus areas in addition to mental health services and health and wellness. Our innovative programs are designed to empower youth to excel in school, become good citizens, and lead healthy, productive lives.

Marissa began attending the Boys & Girls Club when she was in the fifth grade at Potter Elementary. When she first started she was shy, but

it did not take her long to acclimate to the program. One of her favorite programs is SMART Girls, a healthy lifestyles and attitudes program for female members.

During her freshman year, Marissa competed in the 2018 Michigan Youth of the Year (YOY) Competition and placed fourth. She also graduated from the TeenQuest program and participated in the Summer Youth Initiative Job Fair, where she got her first job at the Club as a Junior Staff member. She assisted in the Coat Room and other areas around the Club, including in the cafeteria where she served meals to members through a partnership with the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan.



Marissa continued attending the Club throughout high school and participated in workforce development and leadership programs. Her senior year she participated in the 2021 Michigan YOY Competition. Marissa is currently a freshman at Michigan State University and deciding on her major.
